Started in 1995 with the Ministry of Basic Education, Sport and Culture, the project now supports 19 young people at residential schools in Namibia. Highlights of 2000 included the good progress of bursary recipients, the establishment of a university scholarship fund and continuing support from branches, members and assisting organisations.

The support enabled the project to be extended at the request of the Ministry to four new participants; three of them at school and one, Cwisa Cui from the Bushman community at Tsumkwe, at teacher training college in Windhoek. Cwisa Cui was the guide on some of the monitoring visits kindly arranged by the Ministry of Basic Education, Sport and Culture during the year.

It was a great pleasure to see all those connected with the project again, and no report would be complete without reference to the continuing care and involvement of the long term project team in Namibia: Hon Clara Bohitile, Deputy Minister of Basic Education, Sport and Culture; Mr Walter Nel, Chief Inspector of Education (Primary); Mr Dick Chamberlain, Director of the University of Namibia's Language Centre; and Professor Peter Katjavivi, Vice Chancellor.
